Ministru

Often in ministry there is a need to break through some kind of barrier. Someone may be in great need but not trusting of those who would bring help. A neighborhood may have some people who are ready to begin a life of faith in Jesus but there seems to be no way to connect with them. In these cases, and many others, the temptation for us in the church is to run after them with our own plans and energy. Often when we approach things that way we find that we are not successful and are left burnt out. I once heard it described this way, "If we send time breaking down doors God did not lead us to break down our ministry becomes rehanging doors." That may be overstating the situation , but you get the idea.

Grace

One of the assumptions that we can make and trust is that God is already at work in the cases where we find barriers. We can assume and trust that God is at work on the other side of the barrier. We then need to know how and where God is at work on the other side of that barrier. How is God working in the heart of the person in need who has no trust in us? How is God at work in the neighborhood where we have no ready means of connecting? How can we join in with God in situations like these? The fist thing to remember is that God wants us to join in the work of the kingdom. The second thing the remember is the God is in the business of breaking down barriers (see the verse above). Finally, God provides the ability and opportunity by grace to break the barriers and join in the mission. How is God leading you right now through any barriers in ministry that are before you?
